

Today at Valley Oaks we attended a Farm Workshop where we learned how to trim grape vines and fruit trees. Mrs. Roberts and Mr. Warren led the class.

For the grape vines, you look for and pick two to three of the strongest vines to keep and then chop the unnecessary growth off the vines. In order to grow new grape vines, you pick a good branch, roll it in a specialized rooting fertilizer, poke holes in a styrofoam cup, and then plant it in the cup with the soil, and water it.


